6. Emma tries to act big like her older brother, then little like her younger brother. What are some things you miss and don't miss about being younger? What are some things you do and don't look forward to about being older?
7. If you could pick, would you choose to be younger, older, or the same age you are now? Why?
8. On page 28, Big and Sara make a trap that causes Emma to fall in a hole at the beach. Did someone ever play a mean prank on you? How did it make you feel?
